- 4. Street address.
- 5. Description of the significance of the project and the role of the landscape architect (80-100 words).
- 6. Two or more digital photos 1200 x 800 (1.5 x 1) and only horizontal / landscape format. If file sizes exceed 8 MB, please upload to an FTP site and provide a link.

- A. Obtain approval from the client and other professionals involved in the design as appropriate, before submitting it to the Sitelines Web Atlas.
- B. Are prepared to provide a full list of the project team members upon request.
